

Obituary Notice of ¹⁹⁰²1927 Geo. Mihm, St. Lucas

George Mihm was born at St. Lucas April 22, 1902, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clemence Mihm. He attended the parochial school, where he finished the eighth grade.

In 1917 he went to St. Francis seminary at Milwaukee, where he received his high school and college education. In 1925, having decided to enter the priesthood, he placed himself under the archbishop's command, who directed him to study theology at St. Paul's seminary, St. Paul. The first two years were made successfully, but before the first semester of the third was over, it was difficult for him to go on with his studies, owing to poor health, and by the middle of the following February, he came home to try to regain his health. He was home almost a year when he died on Feb. 1.

At the church ceremony before the burial, Father Schuh sang the solemn requiem mass, assisted by Father Toomey of West Union, as deacon, Urban Bucheit of Festina as sub-deacon, Leo Dee as master of ceremonies. Mr. Vernon, Mr. Sindelar, and Mr. Peters, seminarians and friends of the deceased, were present in the sanctuary. A very touching sermon was delivered by Father Schuh.

All of the surviving members of the family were home and present at the funeral; Sister M. Beata of Mt. St. Francis, Dubuque; his brother Charles of St. Francis seminary, Milwaukee; Henry, Joseph, and Bernard of St. Lucas; his sisters, Barbara and Mrs. John L. Langreck; and his father and mother; also his uncle, Henry Mihm, from Medford, Wis.

Dies Saturday, Age 24

George Mihm, aged twenty-four, died Saturday morning at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clemens Mihm, four miles southeast of St. Lucas, after a long illness. He was studying for the priesthood, and was within one year of his ordination when his health failed, and he was compelled to return from the seminary at St. Paul to his home.

The funeral was held yesterday forenoon from St. Luke's church, conducted by the pastor, the Rev. Fr. Schuh.
